Megan Leahey: Next Tuesday at 8:00 or 9:00pm, we are going to have a Super Smash Bros Tournament. Reading passes 30-0-0

Open Discussion:

Vinita: Tonight, this is something that I know a lot of you have wanted to talk about, and it is important. We will be discussing technology. I would like to focus on mycourses and mygeneseo because they are new. Technology issues in general can be discussed, and the minutes will be sent to the people who need to see them.

Rahul Singh: I find mycourses to be very user friendly, except in the past, I used to be able to get stuff from the professor's outboxes, but now you cannot access anything other than the classes that you are registered for, and you cannot look at things from past semesters.

Tom: I think it should be school policy that the professors put their syllabi online for both current and previous semesters. It makes it easier for registering for classes.

Vinita: Keep in mind that the provost will be at AAC tomorrow, so you can always bring these questions to her.

Mary Rosch: I think that for all classes that I have been in when the professor used mycourses, I would like to look back on that information, and once you are out of the class, there is no way to retrieve that information. You should be able to access them even after the semester ends.

Laura Bugaj: I would definitely agree that mycourses is user friendly, but it is not widely used by professors. I feel that it is a resource that is going to waste.

Will: In one of my classes, the professor has all of the readings posted online because there is no text book, and they are supposed to be on mycourses, but he has nothing posted. It can be confusing sometimes.

Vinita: Have any of you who have professors that use it helped you along with figuring it out?

Alicia: Last semester, I had a couple professors who used it regularly, and it was helpful to be able to go on and look at things, but they explained it, so it was easy to navigate. I would like to see it used more as well.

Tom: In one of my classes, we have a discussion board, and after a certain amount of time, the articles do not pop up, so it is possible that the readings have expired if they are not posted.

Shane: Just from what I have heard from professors, it is user friendly from the students' side, but it is more confusing for them to post things. I do not know if it is a glitch in the system or if they just do not understand it, but maybe there could be faculty training?

Mary Rosch: There was training for it.

Christina: As freshman during orientation, we had a minor tutorial, but there should be more opportunities for that for transfer students as well.

Megan: I know that I have had a couple of professors that have posted things in the wrong format, so that could be worked on.

Melissa: One thing that I do not like is when you click on the links, it opens them up in the small box instead of taking up the whole screen. I have also had classes in which it is used really well. I like the discussion board because other students can post to help with problems. A lot of professors have put supplemental information that they cannot cover in class on there so that we can get the information outside of class.

Tom Johns: I just want to let people know that if you are having trouble with mycourses, there is a tour that you can take on the website to teach you how to use it.

Jon: In one of my classes, we use the clickers. I think it would be good if more professors used them because it would save paper in large classes, and it would be worth it to buy one if you used it in multiple classes.

Laura: Comparing it to eres, a professor can post something right away, whereas with eres, there was a longer delay.

Dan: I was going to suggest mycourses being something that was used during INTD 101 or 105 for incoming students to learn about it early.

Mary Rosch: I am hearing a lot of people saying that it is easy to understand and others are saying it is confusing. One thing that can help streamline it is when you click on a course, it takes you to that specific course and blocks everything else unless you go to the homepage. I would suggest having all of the courses you are in listed at the top of the screen so that you can go back and forth and maybe have course materials and the other tabs on the side instead of on the top.

Laura: With the calendar, if there was a way that, as a student, you could create your own calendar to incorporate your courses to see what you have coming up in each class, it would be more helpful.

Jess: I know that on mycourses, it has the reports section where you can get grades, and I would like to see professors use that more often so you can actually track your progress.

Vinita: I have another question that I would like to ask. What I am hearing is that having a lot of information out in one space is useful, but does anybody feel that that compromises security so that having all of that information in one place is an issue?

Dan: Does mygeneseo time out if you are inactive?

Vinita: Yes.

Christina: I believe it times out after 8 or 9 minutes.

Mary Rosch: I know that your password is the same for your email at the beginning of the year. I do not know if you can change that so that it is different or that it has to stay the same for your email, but a variety of passwords may be a way to help with security issues, because if you know someone's email and password, you can log into everything. If you can log into their email and mygeneseo, you can get onto their knightweb and mess with a lot of things, so that is something to look into.

Sam Feldmeyer: I am pretty sure that there is a way to change your password on knightweb.

Mary Rosch: I am not talking about changing your password, I am talking about having different passwords for everything because if it is all the same and has to be the same, that makes it a lot easier to get into everything.

Tom: I agree about the passwords, but for mycourses, unless you have a lot of enemies, I do not think that hackers will try to get into that.

Laura: As far as changing your password on knightweb, I had to change mine and all of mine were the same, but when I changed it on knightweb, it did not affect the others.

Christina: You can get to your knightweb account without logging in through mygeneseo. You can click on it there and get into it without actually logging in which gives access to everything, including your address.

Alicia: From the mygeneseo, like we have said, you can switch over to knightweb, which is convenient, but I would like to see them have a password prompt when you click on those links. I would rather see them somewhat encrypted that completely available. Your account information is available through that, and I would feel safer if those were password protected.

Serge Berig: Mycourses is encrypted to protect against sniffing, which is something that checks for open connections to websites to get information, so it is difficult to hack into. The only way is to use random letters and numbers to try to crack the password.

Will: I like the idea of having different passwords for everything, but for me, I like having the same password because I always forget them. I would like to have the option of having different passwords, but it should not be made mandatory.

Tom: I think it is a good idea for everyone to have their computers password protected so that other people cannot go on your computer and access things.

Rahul: This is somewhat off topic, but I liked the outboxes.

Vinita: They were used at the discretion of the professors.

Mary Rosch: They had lower memory compared to mycourses, because you can have links to things instead of actually posting things.

Laura: I have heard professors complain about them in the past because they are time consuming.

Alicia: I am also in favor of mycourses over the outboxes because I think you can only get to them on a school computer.

Amanda Greene: You cannot access the inboxes, but you can get to the outboxes.

Sam: There are directions online on how to access the outboxes from your computer. On the Geneseo website, you can search for boxes and see those.

Amanda Kurtis: I know the first few weeks I was here, I did not know where anything was, so I had to use the Geneseo website to find everything. I would like to have a link on the Geneseo website that shows you all of the things that are available to us and where to find them.

Eleanor: It took me a while to figure out, but there is a link to webmail at the bottom of the Geneseo website. I think it should be more visible and other things like mygeneseo should be included.

Mary Rosch: There is a link to mygeneseo at the top of the page as well.

Eleanor: The links should be closer together.

Melissa: Going back to security, it is kind of weird that Geneseo has the phonebook right on their website, and you can type in someone's name and find out where they live.

Mary Rosch: You can change that information if you do not want it posted through knightweb. You can search for student information and take that off, but Geneseo students could not see it either.

Melissa: I do not mind it being online, but I think it should be on mygeneseo instead so that only students can access it.

Megan: Someone asked me for information like that once and I did not want to give it to her because I did not know if she was a student.

Melissa: Also, I have gotten weird telemarketing phone calls on my campus phone line.

Laura: The school may sell our phone numbers.

Vinita: I am not sure that that is true, and you said that you are not sure either, but that is a big claim to make, so please only make statements like that if you know they are true.

Christina: As a point of reassurance as far as phone numbers being online, if someone is calling you and you think they are on campus, they can be tracked through CIT.

Mary Rosch: Something that has been talked about a lot lately is how much energy we are using on the whole such as keeping computers on when buildings are closed, trying to work on reducing those things and reducing the amount of lights that are kept on all the time. There is no real reason for it, so maybe reducing the amount of technology we are using, especially when buildings are locked.

Vinita: The idea behind the lights being on when buildings are locked is so that when someone is in the building when they should not be, the lights being on makes it easier to see.

Mary Rosch: I am talking more about computers being left on.

Alicia: I know there are 24-hour computer labs in South Hall, but sometimes they lock the building.

Will: You have to get there before it locks. They will not kick you out, but they will not let you in after the building closes.

Alicia: Maybe there could be one door that is left unlocked and is watched with a camera to allow students in.

Vinita: Speaking of cameras, did you all receive the safety survey? It was sent out and it talked about safety on campus. I will look into that and make sure that you all get it.

Amanda Greene: Maybe as another possibility for South Hall, since we all have our ID cards to get into the buildings, maybe they could set it up so that only students can get in at night.

Mary Rosch: There should always be functioning printers and paper in the Halls that can print double sided pages.

Kevin Hahn: If you have any problems with your Hall printer, your RAs and RDs/ACs can help you with that. CIT is providing paper for those printers, so if it is out, please talk to your Residence Life staff. If it is broken, talk to them as well.

Dan: Is there going to be a switch toward HD so that some TVs will not work?

Rahul: I heard that it will not affect cable, so it should not be a problem.
